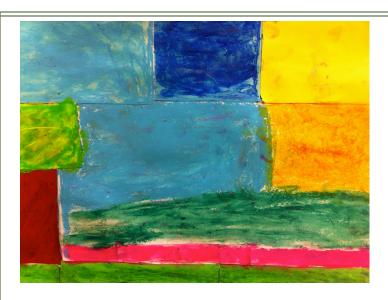

### **ESSENTIAL QUESTIONS**

- · How do artists suggest place without imagery and detail?
- What can we find in our community that is important?
- What can we tell is valuable to our community on campus?

**OBJECTIVE** Students produce a mixed media composition of color inspired by the colors of their campus, neighborhood and community.

### MATERIALS

- Richard Diebenkorn,
  "Ocean Park #83" @ Corcoran
- glue, scissors,
- paint chips, oil pastels



#### STUDENTS WILL BE ABLE TO:

- Collect colors from walk
- Abstract the imagery with sections of color
- Combine materials to create effects
- Describe their composition of color
- Analyze art work of their peers

## STUDENT UNDERSTANDING

- Artists use self expression to illustrate specific places
- Combining a variety of lines and shapes creates space
- Layering materials creates texture

- 4 Student minimalized imagery to colors
- 3 Student minimalized expected amount
- 2 Student minimalized half of imagery
- 1 Student used imagery to define scene

Assisting to ADAPT

## LESSON STEPS

## Step 1- Describe

Using Richard Deibenkorn's paintings "Ocean Park #83" and Cityscape I, students describe the colors that they find and what the color may suggest in the painting: land, street, beach, ocean, architecture.

"In the colors we see, what do you think the colors may represent in the painting?"

## Step 2-Analyze

"What else could the colors represent?"

"Where does your idea come from?"

Students begin to share an experience that connects color to memory.

# Step 3- Gather

Select 2 to 4 sites on and around campus to investigate the colors. Tell them we are gathering colors in our mind to use for an artwork.

"We will make 3 stops in our community. Keep the colors in your mind and we can think about why these sites would be important to our community"

I selected: school garden & entrance, shops & church across street, neighborhood community center

# Step 4-Select & Apply

Students select materials and start to create the composition: layering, blending, cutting

## Step 5-Closing

Students recall the colors they selected from our sites and the location of their work.
